Deaths

SPAYD—Albert Henry Spayd, a resident of Centre Hall for twenty-two years, having come here from Walker township, died suddenly on Saturday morning from a heart condition. In his usual health that morning, he went to the orchard of his son-in-law, Roy Dutrow, to cut weeds with a scythe, but had done little cutting before he apparently sat down under a tree, where he was found still in death by the son-in-law named. There was every evidence that death came without a struggle, the scythe having been laid aside carefully, and the hat and glasses of the man in proper position. The formality of calling the family physician was adhered to, who pronounced Mr. Spayd dead.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the home and burial made in the family plot in Cedar Hill cemetery at Salona. Ministers officiating were Rev. R. H. Jones of Landisburg and Rev. H. I. Crow of Bethlehem, both former pastors of the deceased.

Deceased was a son of John and Julia (Yearick) Spayd and was born at Jacksonsville, Nov. 6, 1862, making his age 76 years, 8 months, 2 days. His marriage to Rebecca Emerick, who survives, took place in 1893, the couple setting up housekeeping in Jacksonsville.

Mr. Spayd in his early life engaged as a lumberman and carpenter, having been employed on a number of buildings erected in Bellefonte and State College. On locating in Centre Hall in 1917 he purchased the home at present occupied by R. S. Jansing, and four years later built the home where he since lived. A short time later he built a second home for his son-in-law and daughter.

During the time he lived here he was a member of the Grange Fair committee and during the past twelve years was the ground superintendent. He was also a member of the local P. O. S. of A., and the Lutheran church.

While a resident of Walker township he served as school director, assessor and tax collector. In the latter capacity he was exceptionally successful, collecting almost every dollar assessed.

Mr. Spayd was affiliated with the Democratic party. Surviving him in addition to Mrs. Spayd, is a daughter, Madeline, wife of Roy Dutrow, and a grandson, Albert Dutrow. One daughter died in infancy. Brothers and sisters surviving are James E., Samuel, George, and Miss Metta Spayd, of Bellevue, Ohio, all of whom attended the funeral.

Mr. Spayd was disposed to be frugal in habit, but lived in comfort and promptly met his obligations. He owned one of the largest and most productive farms in Potter township.

WAGNER—Mrs. Cora Anna Wagner of Juniata died at her home Monday night of last week after several months illness of a heart condition. Born at Oak Hill, she was a daughter of Lat W. and Rebecca (Shirk) Kimpfort. She married William A. Wagner in 1894. The couple went to Juniata where they have resided ever since. Brumbaugh, of Juniata; one granddaughter, two brothers, Samuel Kimpfort of Reedsville and John of Boalsburg, and two sisters, Miss Myra Kimpfort of Bellefonte and Mrs. Francis Miller of State College. Mrs. Wagner had been a faithful member of Trinity Lutheran church in Juniata since becoming a resident there.

Burial was made at Boalsburg last Thursday.
