FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn's State College School of Agriculture

Army Worm on March—When army worms move into corn fields, destruction may result. Entomologists of the Pennsylvania State College recommend stopping their march. Control is achieved by spraying or dusting, use of poison baits, plowing furrows in fields, or attacks of natural enemies. Ask your county agent for details.

Oats are Turkey Feed—Growing turkeys can make good use of oats. During hot weather, turkeys will eat more oats than wheat or corn, say Penn State poultry specialists. The oats encourage growth and are an aid in controlling feather picking and cannibalism.

Control Chinch Bugs—Chinch bugs can cause great damage in corn fields. The job of farmers is to keep the bugs from reaching the corn, say Penn State entomologists. This he can do with sprays or barriers. Detailed information on control practice is available at the office of your county agent.

Stop Black Pox—When the weather is wet in summer, black pox on apple trees may become worse. This disease attacks leaves, limbs, and fruit, explain plant pathologists of the Penn State College. Copper fungicides in the late cover sprays were more effective than sulphur fungicides in preventing leaf and fruit infection last year.

Prevent Barn Fires—Wet hay in barns may cause spontaneous combustion. Agricultural engineers of the Penna. State College urge farmers to put only well-cured hay in mows and to avoid packing of hay where it drops from the fork.
