Timely Reminders from The Penn'a State College School of Agriculture

Club Members to Meet—Two events will bring more than a thousand 4-H club members to the Pennsylvania State College August 14 to 18. These are the Leadership School for older club members and State Club Week for all, with judging contests, recreation, assemblies, and vesper services.

Plant Peonies Now—Peonies may be planted now, according to ornamental horticulturists of the Pennsylvania State College. Early planting helps the divisions to produce feeding roots before top growth develops in the spring.

Produce Quality Milk—Production of wholesome milk is not a simple process. Penn State dairy specialists point out. Many factors are involved, including the dairyman, the cows, their surroundings, their feed, the utensils, and the methods of handling the herd and of cooling and care of the product.

Plant Cover Crop—When vegetables are cultivated the last time or in space vacated by harvesting, Italian or Domestic ryegrass may be sown as a cover crop.

Storage Helps Farmers—Cold Storage lockers are proving to be a convenience to farmers in providing more and better food for their families.

When to House Pullets—If comfortable quarters are available, pullets may be moved from the range to houses as soon as they start production, say Penn State poultrymen.
