Early Monday morning the Loughner gas station, operated under lease by R. L. Campbell, State College, was completely destroyed by fire. The investigation begun by the motor police has not been completed.

The Centre Hall pumper, manned by Stanley Brooks and J. S. Boozer, responded to a call for aid, but could do nothing to save the gas-restaurant structure.

Mr. Campbell and a nephew claim they escaped from the burning structure by jumping from a second story window. Some time prior to that it is said the men heard some one leaving the station.

The owner only recently added restaurant fixtures. There is some insurance held on the structure.
