LEMON— 9:45—Sunday School. 11:00—Church Service. REQUESTS FOR EMERGENCY SEED EXCEEDS EXPECTATIONS

Requests for alsike and timothy seed, for replanting under the AAA Emergency Reseeding Program for drought-damaged seeding in 47 counties, have by far exceeded original expectations, according to the State Agricultural Conservation Committee, today, James E. Walker, chairman of the State Committee in reporting a "virtual avalanche of requests for seed" stated this demand indicated that drought damage was greater than at first estimated.

Since the 43 counties throughout the State originally included in the designated area were announced, four additional counties, Mercer, Erie, Potter, Cambria, have been added.

Recent rains have made reseeded practical and the new growth should provide winter cover protection from soil erosion and add to the feed supply for livestock, Chairman Walker pointed out.

September 10 is the deadline for reseeding with the seed supplied by the AAA.

The State Committee has emphasized that this alsike and timothy is available to any farmer who has suffered damage to his spring seedlings of legumes through the recent drought. He need not be a participant in the Agricultural Conservation Program. All that is necessary is for a farmer to certify to his County Agricultural Conservation Office that his seedlings have been destroyed and alsike and timothy to the limit of one-half his soil-building payment, will be supplied for reseeding this acreage or re-enforcing any acreage seriously damaged. The seed will be supplied through local county dealers. The committee further emphasized that the reseeded program will not affect regular 1939 AAA conservation payments to farmers.

Farmers who wish to obtain alsike and timothy under this emergency program should make application at their local Agricultural Conservation Office, located in this county at the Bellefonte post office building.

STATE TO REFUND CHAIN STORE TAX PAYMENTS In order to obtain refunds of monies paid into the State Treasury under the provisions of the Act of June 5, 1937, all that is necessary is for the petitioner to file a written application with the Board of Finance and Revenue at Harrisburg. Blank forms for the purpose will be supplied by the Board of Finance and Revenue, care of the State Treasury Department, State Capitol, upon request. The petition may be executed by any principal officer of the claimant, if a corporation, or by the owner or partner, if not.

Bower of Bellefonte, former secretary and director of the Centre County Mothers' Assistance Board, died Thursday morning at her home of complications following a several months' illness. Mrs. Bower, who served the board in that capacity from September of 1936 until April of 1938, was 52 years of age at the time of her death.

Mrs. Bower, member of the Evangelical church and active in church affairs and the W.C.T.U. of Bellefonte, was at one time vice-chairman of the Centre County Democratic party and a member of a number of Bellefonte clubs. She is a past worthy Matron of the Bellefonte chapter of the Order of Eastern Star, and a past president of the Bellefonte Women's Club. She also served many years as president of the Centre County Hospital Auxiliary. She prepared for public school teaching early in life, and for several years taught the Colyer school in Potter township.

Mrs. Bower was born in Tusseyville, November 4, 1886, a daughter of James and Kezia Stambach Swabb. Her husband, Ebon B. Bower, secretary-treasurer of the Pennsylvania Potato Growers Association, survives with one sister and brother, Mrs. Leora Burd of Millheim, and Paul Swabb of Spring Mills. She was the youngest of a family of seven children.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at her late home with Rev. H. H. Jacobs officiating. Interment was made in Union cemetery, Bellefonte.

WITMER—The death of Edward Charles Witmer, on Monday, at Axeman, is thought to have been due to injuries received in a motorcycle accident two years ago. He was aged 34 years and was born in Buffalo, Run Valley. A wife and three small children survive.

Following her marriage to Col. Nichols, she became a resident of Williamsport, where she had since resided. She was a member of the Reformed church.

Surviving are her husband, three sons and one daughter: Ida, at home; Leonard, of Williamsport; W. B. of Shamokin Dam, and M. Reed of Roosevelt, N. Y. Also surviving are nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon and burial made in Wildwood cemetery, Williamsport.

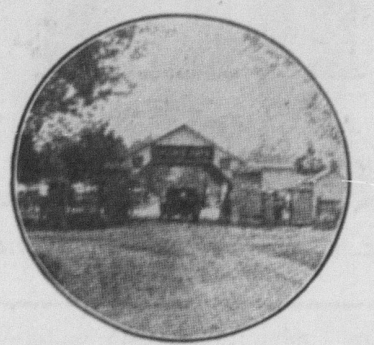
