The State Committee has emphasized that this alsike and timothy is available to any farmer who has suffered damage to his spring seedings of legumes through the recent drought. He need not be a participant in the Agricultural Conservation Program. All that is necessary is for a farmer to certify to his County Agricultural Conservation Office that his seedings have been destroyed and alsike and timothy to the limit of one-half his soil-building payment, will be supplied for reseeding this acreage or re-enforcing any acreage seriously damaged. The seed will be supplied through local county dealers. The committee further emphasized that the reseeding program will not affect regular 1939 AAA conser-

STATE TO REFUND CHAIN

Blank forms for the purpose will be supplied by the Board of Finance and Revenue, care of the State Treasury Department, State Capitol, upon request. The petition may be executed by any principal officer of the claimant, if a corporation, or by the owner or partner, if not.
