



MERGING OF SCHOOLS

The merger law enacted by the recent General Assembly provides that with the advice of the county superintendent, county and local school boards may formulate plans of reorganization and the school boards of the local districts may make arrangements with respect to the distribution of assets and liabilities of the districts involved.

The plan thus prepared is to be submitted to the State Council of Education for its approval after which the question of merging may be submitted to the electorate for voting. This process requires the preparation of a petition by the county board of school directors which should indicate boundaries of districts to be merged; positions of existing and projected buildings, location of roads and railroads, type of school organization, number of teachers, schedule of lands, property, equipment, assessments, tax rates, etc.

The 1938 hunting license is designed to be more conspicuous than those of previous years. The licenses will have a red background with white numerals, whereas the non-resident licenses will have a green background with white numerals. The licenses are now in the hands of county treasurers and may be purchased.




