Deaths

HOSTERMAN.—Dr. George Washington Hosterman, a citizen of Centre Hall from 1881 to 1920, died at the home of his son, Sumner V. Hosterman, Esq., in Lancaster, on Wednesday of last week, aged 84 years, 6 months and 28 days. Burial was made on Friday, by the side of his wife, formerly Catharine Shull, who died in 1911. Brief services were conducted by Rev. D. R. Keener of the Reformed church.

Dr. Hosterman's death was very unexpected. Although his health had been gradually failing, he was at no time confined to bed. At noon on the day of his death he ate a hearty meal, and from there went to his room. When found he was lying across the bed, fully clad, asleep in death. Conditions led the physician and family to believe he passed away without a struggle.

The deceased was a son of John H. and Susan (Gramley) Hosterman and was born in Miles township, where he began life as a school teacher. On graduating from a Philadelphia dental college he opened an office on Church street, Centre Hall, in 1881. From there he moved his family and office to the home now owned by W. A. Alexander, which at that time was remodeled. Later, about 1900, he built the splendid brown stone residence now owned and occupied by Clyde Dutrow, which was also equipped for a dental office. He resided here until retiring as a dentist in 1920, at which time he went to California to live with his daughter, Helen, wife of Prof. Charles F. Shaw. Some years later he returned to Lancaster and since has lived with his eldest son, Sumner V. Hosterman, Esq.

He survives the deceased three children—Sumner V. Lancaster; John S. Cleveland, O., who at the time of the death of his father was a hospital patient, suffering from a heart affection, and Helen, Mrs. Charles F. Shaw, of Berkeley, Calif.

There also survive him two sisters—Mrs. Clay Weaver and Mrs. Wallace Cryder, both of Rebersburg. Surviving grandchildren are George M. Hosterman, a Scout executive located in Milton, but at this time with a group of Scouts in New Hampshire, and Mrs. Hugh J. Caldwell of Closter, New Jersey, both children of S. V. Hosterman.

Dr. Hosterman was one of the old school dentists and had a modern equipment during his day. He did an extensive business while in Centre Hall.

He was a member of the Reformed church, and a member of the Old Fort Masonic lodge for 47 years; also a member of the Williamsport Consistory. He was elected on the first school board in Centre Hall borough, and held other local offices during his residence here.

Charles F. Shaw, a son-in-law, who came to Centre Hall from Penn State on a soil survey, thirty years ago, and shortly after married Miss Hosterman, located in Berkeley, where he was connected with the University of California, died during the beginning of September. He was a native of one of the New England states.

Confer, of Rebersburg; Mrs. Emma Womelsdorf of Loganton; William Houtz of Kaneville, Ill. and Irvin and Ira Houtz both of Madisonburg.

Burial was made at Greenburr, Rev. Arthur J. Miller of Rebersburg officiating.

MILLER.—Funeral services were held at his late home in Millheim on Saturday afternoon for Kilne Russell Miller, 20 years of age, who dropped dead at his work in the plant of the Millheim Journal at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. He had not been in the best of health for some time.

He was born at Surveyor December 21, 1928, the son of Kline and Sarah Wolf Miller, who survive along with

these sisters: Mrs. Florence K. Smith Tampa, Fla.; Mrs. Dorothy A. Poorman, Emporium; and Miss Ruth Miller, Philadelphia.

The deceased young man was a graduate of the East Penns Valley high school at Millheim. Funeral services were held by Rev. G. A. F. Griesing, and burial made in the Reformed cemetery at Madisonburg.

GARMAN.—Ira D. Garman, a son of the late Daniel and Louise Schreyer Garman, born in Bellefonte, died Friday, aged 77 years and 11 months. He is survived by a wife, formerly Mary Snow of Camden, N. J., and two daughters, Mrs. Charles Hargens and Mrs. May Brommel, both of Germantown, survive.

Edwin F. Garman, Mrs. Rebecca Cruse, both of Bellefonte, Robert of Tyrone, and Mrs. Minnie Maitland of Williamsport, are surviving brothers and sisters.

Burial was made in Harleigh cemetery, Camden.

The deceased was a jeweler, and lived in and about Philadelphia since a youth. He held many positions in religious, fraternal and civic organizations. He was president of the Centre County Association of Philadelphia, and at one time was a member of the Philadelphia school board.

PENN STATE CO-EDS AWARDED \$20,000 IN SUIT

A highway accident near DuBois three years ago in which two Penn State co-eds, of Franklin, were injured, resulted Monday in the Clearfield county court awarding verdicts amounting to \$25,750 against the Anchor Motor Freight Co. of Buffalo, N. Y. The plaintiffs, all of Franklin, were awarded the following: Helen and Jean Blakley, both \$10,000; Mr. and Mrs. Donald Blakley, their parents, a joint settlement of \$3000; William McKelvey, \$1230; Emma McKelvey, \$1,900; William and Emma McKelvey, jointly, \$551.

The Blakley girls, their parents and the McKelveys were riding home for their vacation near Christmas time three years ago in the McKelvey car when a trailer truck owned by the Anchor Freight Co. skidded on an icy curve and crushed the car.

BELLEFONTE BUSINESS MAN A SUICIDE BY GAS

G. W. Heffelfinger, for the past six years proprietor of one of Bellefonte's best known tailoring establishments, was found dead in a second floor kitchen of the Bellefonte Elks' Home, East High street, Tuesday evening of last week. His lifeless body was found in a sitting position over a bank of five gas burners, the valves of four of which had been opened. He was aged 41 years, and leaves a wife and two small children.

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IT COSTS \$22.50 TO LIVE IN CENTRE COUNTY; \$24.82 IN CLEARFIELD, SURVEY SHOWS

Local government costs to the individual taxpayer in Centre county was established at \$22.50 and in Clearfield county at \$24.82, as the State Department of Internal Affairs tabulated this week for the first time in history, the total county costs and per capita rates for 1937.

Taxes in Pennsylvania, it disclosed, cost the average person \$67.60 a year. The public paid \$262,087,615 to the State and of that amount \$29,378,850 was returned to the municipalities by the commonwealth.

Local governments collected \$428,258,956, broken down as follows: Counties, \$53,042,114; poor districts, \$14,921,437; cities, \$128,029,118; boroughs, \$28,772,332; first class townships, \$6,218,821; second class townships, \$5,924,699; schools, \$191,453,535.

In view of the fact that the yearly outlay of tax funds now reaches well over a half a billion dollars, the importance of recording the sources of these funds and purposes for which they are spent becomes increasingly evident," Livengood said.

The reports pertain to 66 counties (Philadelphia is listed as a city), 47 cities and 959 boroughs, 1,577 townships, 424 poor districts (since abolished), and 2,552 school districts. Per capita cost in Huntingdon county for the same year was \$25.09; Blair, \$32.52; Bedford, \$22.18; Cambria, \$33.52. The survey disclosed a range down from a low of \$18.54 in Putson county to \$62.75 in Allegheny county.
