FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn's State College School of Agriculture

Improve Your Pasture—Pastures that were improved by applications of lime and fertilizer have responded rapidly to fall rains and are producing an abundance of good feed, say Penn State Extension agronomists. Applications of lime and fertilizer should be made in the fall, and by early October if possible.

Clean Litter for Layers—Keep a deep bed of dry, broken litter in the laying pens, recommend poultry extension specialists at Penn State. Clean litter promotes sanitation and cleaner eggs are produced. A clean litter keeps the house warmer.

Renovate Lawns in Fall—Nature intended that grasses be seeded in the fall, point out extension agronomists at Penn State. Renovation of lawns in the fall is advisable for this reason. Growing conditions are best in the fall and the seedlings make a good start.

Plan Annual Poultry Meeting—The nineteenth annual poultry short course and semi-annual meeting of the Penna. Poultry Association will be held at the Pennsylvania State College, October 16 to 20.

Next Year's Flower Garden—Now is the time to make plans for next year's flower garden, according to Penn State flower specialists. This includes the control of weeds. Destruction of weed seeds now will lessen the amount of hoeing and cultivating required next year.
