GOULD.—Charles Henry Gould, former State College banker, and father of Mrs. Charles H. Light of Centre Hall, died at 10 o'clock Friday morning in the Centre County hospital of a complication of diseases. Mr. Gould, a resident of Heightstown, N. J., had been spending some time with his son-in-law and daughter, Dr. and Mrs. H. C. Light of Centre Hall and was taken to the hospital on September 22. He was 62 years, 5 months and 21 days old.

Mr. Gould was born in Mt. Carmel, the son of William and Mary Weiden-saul Gould. Mrs. M. H. Watkins of New York City, Mrs. Charles H. Light of Centre Hall, and Mrs. R. P. Koser of Cleveland, O., are surviving daughters. A sister, Mrs. E. M. Burgan of Pottsville, and a half-brother, F. O. Pfouts, of Shamokin, also survive. Mr. Gould was associated with the Masonic order of State College.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Dr. Light home at Centre Hall. Interment was made in Millheim.

Rev. Jones of the State College Presbyterian church officiated.

FRANK.—Mrs. Malissa Frank, wife of Dr. G. S. Frank, of Millheim, died at her home on Saturday forenoon, aged 73 years. Funeral services were held from the home and burial made at Millheim on Monday forenoon, Rev. O. E. Peeman of the Lutheran church officiating.

The husband survives, as do also an adopted son, J. Randall Miller, of Millheim, and a sister. Mrs. Frank was a native of Miles township, but lived in Millheim during all of her married life.

Born Sept. 18, 1859, at Julian, he was the son of Jeremiah and Margaret Raider Merritt. He was married to Laura Dillon, who preceded him in death on May 30, 1922. Surviving children are: Preston of Lock Haven; Richard, Mrs. J. P. McDonald and Mrs. J. Clair Harper, all of State College; Robert, of Jens, Montana, and Donald of Lock Haven. Burial was made at Dunnstown, Clinton county, on Tuesday.

PETERS.—Edward A. Peters, 84, a resident of Julian, died in the Centre County hospital from injuries received when struck by a car between Julian and Unionville, on the forenoon previous to the death. He was a retired farmer, and is said to have crossed the road in front of a car operated by Dorsey Stevens of Davidsville.

The injuries received were both broken ankles, head laceration, and internal injuries.

Edward A. Peters was born in Julian 84 years ago last October 4, a son of Lewis and Beulah Fisher Peters. His wife, the former Julia Berkhammer, died November 21 of last year. SORTMAN.—William H. Sortman of near Howard died Wednesday morning of last week of a heart attack suffered while on his way to Livonia to visit his daughter. He became ill in his car near the Glen Coble home at Tylersville and stopped there. Mr. Coble took him to a doctor and after he was treated, started with Mr. Sortman to Livonia. Mr. Sortman died enroute.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at the Catholic church in Bellefonte, with Father William E. Downes as the officiating clergyman. Interment was made in Bellefonte.

PHILIPSBURG MAN KILLED WHEN PLANE FALLS INTO BAY

Lieut. Jackson H. Gray, 26, a native of Philipsburg, was killed Tuesday when his Army pursuit plane plummeted into Manila Bay. Officers at Nicholas Field said he "flew into the water" during aerial gunnery training apparently because of "failure to pull out of a dive at sufficient altitude... while firing at a target dropped to the water."

Graduated from West Point in 1936, Gray is survived by his wife and three months old baby in Manila, and by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. Gray, Philipsburg.

60 CCC VACANCIES ALLOTTED TO COUNTY

Sixty vacancies in enrollment for CCC camps for Centre county young men were announced by County Board of Public Assistance. Applications will be received at the department's offices in the Temple Court building, Bellefonte, from October 1 to October 20.

The number of vacancies for Centre county is the largest since enrollment in the camps began in 1933 and the ninth largest in the State at this time, according to figures. Boys from 17 to 23 years of age, inclusive, may make application for the camps. Those in families receiving some form of aid or in which the wage-earner is employed by WPA will receive first consideration.

Enlistments are for six months and are open to unmarried youths who are American citizens. Lt. L. E. Fox of the Poe Valley CCC Camp will cooperate with the county board in examining applications and placing those chosen.

Anniversary of Printing Shown With New Postage Stamp

A new three-cent postage stamp commemorating the 399th anniversary of printing in Colonial America, issued last week by the Post Office Department was on sale in Centre Hall a day later. The new stamp, printed in purple by the rotary process, bears a reproduction of the Stephen Daye press. Above and to the right of the press, in two lines, are the dates "1639" and "1939."

Historically, the first press in the British Colonies of North America was set up at Harvard College in the year 1639. This press still continues under the name of The University Press.
