FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penna. State College School of Agriculture

Reducing Farm Fire Losses—More than 70 per cent of farm fires are the result of lightning, spontaneous combustion, defective chimneys, and sparks on roofs. Agricultural engineers at the Penna. State College suggest checking all buildings to eliminate possible fire hazards.

Ryegrass for Hog Pasture—Some of Pennsylvania's swine growers have seeded approximately one-third of their next year's hog pasture to ryegrass this fall report Penn State livestock specialists. The ryegrass will provide extremely early pasturage.

Next Year's Vegetables—Removal of remaining crops and weeds and plowing the ground after a good application of manure is suggested by Penn State vegetable specialists as the proper fall care of the family vegetable garden. Destruction of diseased crops and weeds lessens danger of contamination next year.

Saving Dead Timber—Penn State forestry extension specialists say that the timber from dead or dying trees, killed by three or four successive defoliations by forest tent caterpillars, can be salvaged and used for many useful purposes. They suggest marking the trees this fall.

Fumigating Beans and Peas—Weevils in dry beans and peas can be destroyed by fumigation in an airtight can with carbon bisulfide, claim extension entomologists at Penn State.
