**STOCK AUCTION BRINGS NEARLY \$10,000.00**

The highest price received for an animal in the consignment sale held Thursday afternoon at the Hughesville fair grounds as a concluding feature of the two-day annual convention of the Penna. Federation of Holstein-Friesian Club was \$235.

A female consigned by Carl K. Weber, a 4-H member from Millburg sold for that price.

High bull for the day was bred on Lauxmont Farms, Wrightsville, and brought \$145. Joseph Beckdell of Blanchard purchased the animal. The total sale amounted to \$9,775, or an average of \$137 per head. Animals of all ages were included in the sale, thus reducing the average, officials announced.

**ONLY 25 IMPORTANT VARIETIES OF APPLES**

More than 16,000 recognized varieties of apples are grown in the United States, but fewer than 25 have any commercial importance, claims J. Lupton McCartney, extension pomologist with the Penna. State College. Few varieties are most popular on the market.

The chances of a seedling apple tree developing into an important variety are slight, and are considered by scientists to be less than one in 10,000. There is only a rare possibility that the seedling you have been nursing along in your backyard will have the characteristics for which apple experts are looking.
