### FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn'a State College School of Agriculture

**Bugs Entering Homes.**—Don't worry about the many bugs that may try to enter your home now that the weather has made life uncomfortable for them outdoors. They're looking for a place to hibernate for the winter. Penn State entomologists explain.

**Storing Vegetables.**—Because stored vegetables deteriorate rapidly at a warm temperature it is advisable to adjust the ventilation of the storage room so that cold air can be let in at night and the room kept cool during the day by closing windows and doors, say vegetable experts at Penn State.

**Controlling Plant Diseases.**—Destruction of plant refuse this fall will lessen the disease problem next year, according to plant pathologists at the Pennsylvania State College. Plant diseases are caused by the growth of fungi and bacteria which live in or on green plants. They pass the winter in old stems and leaves.

**Conditions for Apple Storage.**—Careful control of relative humidity, keeping it at approximately 85 per cent with the temperature near freezing, will prevent shriveling. Penn State fruit specialists have found. Even slight shriveling of the fruit will indicate the need for sprinkling floors and walls frequently.

**Don't Mix Your Milk.**—In winter, as in summer, never mix warm milk with some that has already been cooled, warn dairymen at Penn State. If the night milk is held over for the morning delivery, the morning milk must be properly cooled before the two can be mixed safely.

### 1940 CENSUS OF POPULATION AND BUSINESS SOON TO START

Coming up! The 1940 census of population and business which will open in Pennsylvania and the rest of the nation within a few months.

District census supervisors will open offices in Pennsylvania, which will be divided into approximately 34 census districts, late next month or early January. They will then employ their staffs. Tests will be given in the local offices to determine the qualifications of applicants, all of whom, upon employment, will come under the provisions of the Hatch law forbidding political activity.

The census taking is the nation's most monumental and painstaking statistical effort.
