CANADIAN INDIAN ENTERTAINS STUDENTS AT SCHOOL ASSEMBLY

Chief Caribou of the Obijua tribe who lives four hundred miles north of Niagara Falls, in the largest Indian reservation in North America, Temagami, Ontario, spoke of his work as a guide for hunting and fishing parties, and of his native race, at a high school assembly here, Monday.

This Indian, whose American name is Joe Friday, came here through the services of the State Y. M. C. A. with which the school clubs, Hi-Y and Tri-Hi-Y are affiliated. He was introduced by Frederick C. Woltz, State Y. M. C. A. director.

Chief Caribou, who spoke perfect English and who comes from a family of educated Indians, brought a message of racial tolerance and good will. He regrets that the Indians most people contact are of the poorest type, roamers who, like their counterparts in the white race, expect a living from their fellowmen.

He insists that the only way to get a true picture of Indians is to see them in their homes and at work.

To entertain the students Chief Caribou imitated wild animals and told stories of his hunting and fishing expeditions.

FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn'a State College School of Agriculture

Fattening Beef Cattle—Experienced cattle feeders find the first few weeks most critical during the fattening process, say livestock extension specialists at the Penna. State College. During this period it is best to feed all they will eat of such common roughages as hay and corn fodder.

Destroy Garden Rubbish—Because many insects hibernate over winter in dead plant parts, removing debris from gardens and fields will help control insect numbers and lessen the possibility of crop damage next year, claim Penn State's entomologists.

Selecting Vegetable Exhibits—Farm products shows provide an excellent place for advertising vegetables. Make selections now and store the crops properly, suggest specialists at Penn State. The best specimens are those that would meet the most critical market requirements.

Falling Egg Production—A sudden decline in fall egg production is not uncommon, according to extension poultrymen at Penn State. They say it is often the result of a failure of the birds to consume enough feed to meet the requirements of body maintenance and egg production.

Cool Milk Carefully—Even on cool days, milk must be properly cooled, preferably in a covered, insulated cooling tank supplied with fresh cold water, remind Penn State dairymen. Air cooling is unsatisfactory since the air is a poor conductor of heat and cold. Air-cooled milk frequently is returned because of high bacterial count.
