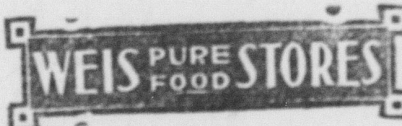

### FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn'a State College School of Agriculture

**Top Entrances for Hives**—A few Penn'a beekeepers are using hives equipped with top entrances, report bee specialists at the Pennsylvania State College. It permits the bees to go directly from the frames to the outside. The small amount of ventilation helps keep the hives dry.

**Popcorn that Pops**—When popcorn is at the right stage for popping it contains approximately 13 per cent moisture, claim specialists in vegetable gardening at Penn State. Dry the corn if it is too damp or expose it to the air for several days if it is too dry.

**Maintaining Winter Egg Quality**—Because the heat from a furnace in the basement where eggs are stored keeps the air too dry, quality will drop during the winter months, Penn State poultry specialists have found. A special room in which humidity can be regulated is desirable if egg quality is to be maintained.

**Don't Burn Leaves**—Burning leaves is like burning so many dollars, assert Penn State specialists. Decayed leaves provide valuable humus for garden soils. Humus helps hold moisture and makes the ground easier to cultivate. A ton of dry leaves contains as much organic matter as three tons of ordinary farm manure.

**Meeting the Feed Shortage**—When

straw is available and hay is scarce, the hay may be reduced to one small feeding per day and more straw fed, say Penn State extension dairy specialists.

**Storing Farm Machinery**—Agricultural engineers at Penn State remind that unstored farm machinery suffers definite economic loss through weathering, drying and rusting.
