Boalsburg was added to the list of communities in Centre county facing a serious water shortage, a notice sent to its consumers by the Boalsburg Water Company indicates.

The notice stated that "scant rainfall and continued freezing weather have caused our water supply to be seriously depleted. You can help this shortage from becoming even more acute by using water only when necessary and in the smallest satisfactory quantities."

Supt. George Mothersbaugh reported 10 inches of ice in the company's reservoir and but a small supply of water entering the main.

ELECTRIC CHAIR AWAITS SLAYER OF POLICEMAN

Governor James on Thursday fixed the week of Feb. 26 for the execution of William H. Yeager, father of nine who has been sentenced to die in the electric chair for the slaying of a state policeman.

Yeager, 55-year-old farmer, was convicted in the shooting of John E. Fessler, 30 at Yeager's remote Cooper township home in Montour county in 1937. Litigation over a new trial held up the disposition of the case since Fessler and two other officers had gone to Yeager's house to serve a warrant on him. The supreme court in upholding the death sentence, observed that "all the evidence points conclusively to the fact that the defendant deliberately prepared to resist arrest and to the extent of committing murder."
