FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Penn'a State College School of Agriculture

Pruning Pine Trees—Side pruning of planted pines, germinant when the trees are 10 feet high and continuing periodically until the best trees are cleaned to about 17 feet from the ground, minimizes the fire hazard, develops better trees, and makes the woodlot more attractive, forestry extension specialists at the Pennsylvania State College say.

Feeding Dairy Cows—The returns a dairyman receives from his herd depend upon the ability of the cows to produce milk and upon the feed and care they receive, claim Penn State dairy specialists. Good feed won't make a poor cow a good producer. Neither will a good cow produce well on poor feed.

Pruning Fruit Trees—The dormant season is the best time to prune fruit trees, Penn state fruit specialists remind. As a rule, it is best to prune hardy varieties of apples and pears first, leaving tender varieties, trees in exposed locations, and those requiring heavy pruning until last.

Building a Spark Arrester—Flying embers start many farm home fires, warn agricultural engineers at Penn State. A homemade spark arrester made from galvanized mesh having one-half inch openings will reduce the danger. The arrester must cover the fire opening and be at least 12 inches high.

New Cauliflower Varieties—Seeds of several new varieties of cauliflower are being offered for sale by seedmen this year for the first time, vegetable experts at Penn State announce. One of these is Super Snowball. Two others are Snowdrift and Holland Erfurt.

Ice Cream Short Course—There is still time to enroll for the short course in ice cream making at the Pennsylvania State College which opens January 22 and continues for two weeks.
