Gregg Voc. Defeats Millheim; Leads In B. B. League Race

Gregg Township Vocational won from East Penn's Valley high of Millheim by a scant 25-23 score on the Spring Mills floor Friday night to take undisputed lead in the Centre-Clinton league race.

Millheim led by 10-8 in the first half but Spring Mills forged out in front, 17-14, in the third period and although it was close all the way, Gregg never lost the advantage.

House, Spring Mills forward, and Gilbert, Millheim guard, shared individual scoring honors with 8 points each.

It was the sixth victory in eight games for Gregg township and the third setback in eight games for Millheim.

BROTHER OF MAN HE SHOT SEES EXECUTION AT ROCKVIEW

A brother of the man he killed on Monday morning witnessed the execution of Benjamin (Duke) Ginyard, 28, Negro slayer of a Pittsburgh policeman, in the electric chair at Rockview penitentiary.

John Conway, a brother of Patrolman Edward Conway, whom Ginyard fatally shot during an attempted hold up in Pittsburgh last June 27, sat in grim-lipped silence as the slayer went to his death.

Thomas Cox, Pittsburgh policeman who narrowly escaped the fate of Patrolman Conway when a burst of gunfire greeted their arrival at the scene of the holdup, also witnessed the execution.
