### WIVES SHOULD FILE FOR DIVORCE, STUDENTS THINK

A fourth of the men students agree with two-thirds of the women in a sociology course at the Pennsylvania State College that the wife should be allowed to file suit for divorce no matter which is the aggrieved party.

A majority of the class felt, however, that in their own cases their first marriage would prove successful.

A poll of the class conducted by the instructor, Peter P. Klussen, showed also that sentiment against easy divorces was more pronounced among the co-eds than among the men. Only one-third of the women felt that mutual consent should be sufficient grounds while three-fourths of the men said it should.

Men rated the causes that would prompt them to seek divorce in the following order: Adultery, desertion, wife drinking, insanity, mental cruelty, neglect to share family expenses and duties.

The order listed by the women students was: Desertion, physical and mental cruelty, neglect to provide, adultery, and insanity.
