Allegany. Miss Rachel McPherson of Pittsburgh, conspicuous for her self-sacrificing devotion to the relief and comfort of the National Soldiers, during the war, died on the 18th.

Massachusetts. Household & School formerly of Bedford, the former recently State Senator, are erecting a large paper mill in Kansas City, Missouri.

Town people "took" \$13 very fine trout from the mountain streams of the Allegany one day last week.

In Howell, Ind. is being made with coke from the Rapid-Top Coal.

Berks. Corporal Wm. Sands, of the 88th Regiment, P. V., was shot in the thigh by a Minnie ball at the battle of First Fort. The ball which was a large one of the "Minnie" species, was only extracted a few days ago by Dr. Beaver. The Corporal feels greatly relieved at the removal of the deposit.

The Democratic members of the Select Council of Reading recently defeated the resolution passed in the Common branch, granting the center of Penn Square as a site for the proposed erection of a Soldiers' Monument.

Every Republican member favored its passage. Gov. Geary has appointed Francis M. Banks and F. R. Schumcker, Esqs., Notaries Public.

McCauley; June 27, Commencement.

Henrietta. Capt. GRANVILLE SWOPE, of the Fifth Regiment Pennsylvania Reserve Corps, and who served three years of the war, died lately at the residence of his mother in Huntingdon.

Lancaster. The Republican Convention which elected delegates to the State Convention, passed three, with other resolutions:

Resolved, That the foundations of the Republic, like the foundations of our Government, are based on the principles of eternal justice, and we would be false to those principles, false to our history, and false to the memory of our brethren, who have died on a hundred battle-fields, in the contest with human slavery, were we to sanction any measure of reconstruction not based on the principle of the equality of all men before the law.

Resolved, That a Government which neglects to make provision for the losses of its citizens, through a careless rebellion, is the less negligent of its duty, and we recognize it as the paramount duty of Congress to enact such laws as will compensate and apply the property of leading and wealthy rebels to the payment of the damages so inflicted.

Resolved, That the course of Hon. Thaddeus Stevens in Congress, has fully met the expectation of his party, and the wise and upright statesman displayed by him, merits efforts to restore a rescued country, upon the principles of justice, equality and right, entitled to the sincere gratitude of all his fellow-citizens.

The Republicans have determined to nominate candidates for County offices by direct vote of the party, instead of delegate conventions.

William A. Marshall, son of Wm. Marshall, has been appointed Cadet to Naval Academy—he having passed the most creditable examination.

A Horticultural Society has been established in Lancaster, and is to hold its first exhibition June 14 and 15.

Washington. The contractors on Western Maryland Railroad have gone to work at various points between Hagerstown and the South Mountain; and subscribers to the stock have been called upon to pay an installment of \$5 per share before 18th inst.

York. The Hanover School Board has been organized, and its officers are: President—Washington Bate; Secretary—Dr. Horace Allen; Treasurer—Howard J. Myers.

Jacob Wray, Esq., has been re-elected President of the Hanover Savings Fund Society, one of the most prosperous moneyed institutions of the State.

Wirt-Monday was a gala day in Hanover. Prof. HAY assisted in the administration of the Commemorative St. Matthew's Church, Hanover on Wednesday.

Hanover Lodge No. 187, L. O. F., was dedicated on Monday afternoon, the 10th—Lodges from York and Gettysburg were present. Addresses were delivered by Revs. S. B. Yigling, and J. A. Ross, and by J. W. Bittinger, Esq.

A Hanover Dram. Corps has been organized in Hanover, Pennsylvania, for the Fall Campaign.

The York County Fair will be held in York, October 1, 2, 3 and 4. It will be the tenth Annual Meeting.

Mrs. Julia Ann Sanger of the neighborhood of Hanover Junction, the daughter of

Reuben Kelly deceased of Hanover, and sister of Jacob Kelly of this place, died suddenly about two weeks ago. She was driving over her home, and took suddenly ill, and died in a few minutes after being taken home. She was in her thirty-third year.

A grand scheme is on foot in Chicago to build a magnificent system of docks, to extend several hundred feet from the shore, along the lake for the distance of half mile. The estimated cost is for \$5,000,000, and it is said private capitalists are ready to undertake it whenever the Government consents to extend the pier as required, and the city has agreed to surrender its right to the present lake front.

The Grand Lodge of the Good Templars of Pennsylvania, a branch of the Masonic Order and embracing three of its degrees, convened in session at Mohawk Hill, Pittsburgh, on the 11th. Three hundred and fifty-three Lodges were represented, and there were seven hundred delegates on the floor. Every district in the State was represented. The annual report shows that the membership of the organization in Pennsylvania has increased to 20,000.

Ground has at last been broken in the Public Square, Hanover, for the Monument to the memory of the soldiers from Wayne county, Pa., who fell in battle or by disease, during the rebellion. The foundation will be put in so that the corner stone will be laid July 4th.
