Hitherto one of the most potent objections to their assumption has been the allegation that many of the claims were excessive and fraudulent, and hold by speculators. Let this objection be removed by a fair adjudication of the real damage sustained, and a future Legislature may be induced to give at least a reasonable indemnity.
