REYNOLDS MONUMENT.—A meeting of the Committee of the First Corps, Army of the Potomac, having in charge of the Reynolds Monument fund, was held at Philadelphia, on the 17th inst. The treasurer reported \$700 received in five-twenty United States bonds, and a cash balance of \$103.63. This fund, which at a fair valuation amounts to about \$750, is not sufficient to justify the committee in erecting the monument.
