PERSONAL.—C. W. C. Case, Columbia, Pa., President of the Gettysburg Railroad Company, is in London and expects to remain abroad three months.

MILITARY PRINCIPLES.—A Military Band, under the auspices of the Franklin Zouaves, Capt. Eitzen, and the Gettysburg Zouaves, Capt. Norris, will be held in the Grove near Grape Vine School House, Butter township, on Saturday, the 20th of May.

PROPERTY SALES.—George E. Bringham, Esq., of Gettysburg, has sold his Forge property to Jacob Reiley of Gettysburg and George E. Smyser of York, for \$40,000. Mr. Frederick Wolf has sold his farm, in Straban township, to Jonas Robert, at \$10,000—about 104 acres.

FAIR.—A Fair will be held in the School House of St. Aloysius Catholic Church in Littlestown, to commence on the last Monday in this month and continue until Saturday evening, for the benefit of the school. A vocal and instrumental concert, for the same purpose, will be given some time during the week, in Myer's Hall.

VALUATION OF BANK STOCK.—Judge Fahn of York, the Assessor appointed by Gov. GRANT to assess the bank stock in this county, for purposes of taxation, has completed the valuation of the stock of the Gettysburg National Bank, at \$60 per share (par value \$50) and of the First National at \$100 (par value \$100).

NEW POST OFFICE.—The Post Master General has established a Post Office in the Gettysburg township, in the town of Weikert, and appointed William S. Cart, Esq., Post Master. A recent act of Congress established a new route from York Springs to Weikert, via Middleburg which we presume will be soon put.

MEDICAL.—At the meeting of the Homeopathic Medical Society, in Harrisburg, on the 12th, we observe that Dr. J. H. Menden of York Springs was chosen one of the Board of Censors for the ensuing year. Gettysburg was proposed "on account of its historic interest," as the next place of meeting, but was not unanimously selected.

SUPREME COURT.—On Monday last, the Supreme Court dispensed of the following cases: Harner vs. Fisher, Adams County, Judgment affirmed. Cumberland Mutual Protection Insurance Company vs. Douglas et al., This is the case of the Catalonia Spring case. Adams County, Judgment affirmed.

NEWS OF NEIGHBORING COUNTRIES.

RECORD.—On the 20th inst., Mr. Benjamin Shiner, of Junius township, captured an eagle measuring seven feet two inches from the tip of one wing to the tip of the other.

CARROLL.—On the 20th, the cornerstone of M. E. church was laid at Union Bridge. Westminister is rapidly improving, factories are in course of erection, and building is very active.—John K. Longwell, Esq., is a candidate for the Cooperated nomination for Congress in the district composed of Carroll, Frederick, Washington and Allegany. Col. Manly of Frederick is a candidate, also Mr. Syester of Washington. Last fall, the Corps carried every county.

CUMBERLAND.—Carlisle Herald says that during the bombardment of Carlisle by Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, in 1863, a conical shell struck the house of William Best, but did not explode. This missile, after having been preserved as a memento for several years, was thrown aside, and ultimately found its way into the coal bin. On Monday last, the shell, without being observed was shoveled into the cook stove and thence carried to the back yard. The explosion occurred at 10 o'clock, and the fragments were thrown upon the fire. For many quarters of an hour after this Mrs. B. and her daughter were about the stove preparing dinner, and they had just stepped into another room when a most terrific explosion occurred, shaking the house to its foundation. The only real damage done was to the chimney, which was blown in pieces.—The Carlisle First National bank has made a dividend of six per cent to stockholders, and carried two per cent to surplus fund. The deposit has been made of four per cent.

FRANKLIN.—Gov. Geary re-appointed Jacob Hostetter, Notary Public at Greensboro. A town hall has been erected at Fayetteville.—Judge Lee of Hollidaysburg, in his 75th year, is active in the county.—A meeting was held in Chambersburg on the 19th, to take measures to secure the completion of the terminus of the projected railroad from Waynesboro to the Cumberland Valley road. Scotland is the other point named for the terminus, but it is said it could be more cheaply built to Chambersburg. Committees were appointed to solicit subscriptions, and another meeting was held for the 19th.—A Railroad Convention will be held at Mercersburg on Wednesday, May 20th, whose object is to devise means by which to construct a Railroad from Mount Union by way of Fort Detton and Mercersburg, connecting with some road east of the latter place.

FREDERICK.—Forty shares of Central National bank were recently sold at \$32 1/2 per share, par value \$25; five shares of Woodboro and Frederick turnpike stock at \$30, par value \$20.—W. C. Lander has been elected President of the Frederick and Emmisburg turnpike company. John B. Weyer, Secretary and Treasurer, J. W. Mardock, Superintendent.—Books are opened for subscribing the stock of the Buckeystown turnpike road company.—William L. W. Sargent, Esq., late Land Commissioner of Maryland, and formerly of this county, has opened a real estate agency in Frederick.

WASHINGTON.—The Monument to be erected in Antietam Center will be of marble, 40 feet high one-half of which will conform to the statue of a Union soldier in full uniform with musket and other accoutrements.

YORK.—The First National bank of Wrightsville has made a dividend of five per cent. A building association has been formed at Wrightsville.—The York county National bank and the York National bank have declared a dividend of six per cent, and the first National of eight, and the York and Wrightsville turnpike, three per cent.—The Board of the Moravian church, at Nazareth.—Various improvements are in progress in York, and the extension of the railroad to York from Frederick to Hanover is urged to York.—Two engines have been purchased for the Lancaster and York railroads, one costing \$4,500, the other \$3,500.
