Now this is perhaps the only reason that many farmers can give for ploughing deep. We will admit the fact contained in this article, because it is a fact, but as likely to have been a fiction if not proved that deep ploughing is not only good, but absolutely necessary to produce good crops.

Two farmers, A and B, plough their ground at the same time, though four inches deep. A ploughs eight inches deep, and B ploughs eight inches deep, and the summer work their corn all the way. But neither has any advantage over the other, there is something to be trusted to. Providence and we will see which one it favors.

I could say much more upon this subject, but feeling that I have already trespassing rather than properly permitted, I will not try to give any more reasons for deep, deep ploughing.

Several Potato Paralysis.—A sack of fine sliced in water, a handful of salt added, and a few green onions, enough worked in to make five barrels in all.—Throw half a pint in a barrel at planting.

Quinine Food for Plants.—There are two kinds of plants which are attacked by a parasite which attacks the ravages of the disease—the Columbia and Henckley. In the former, the parasite deposits its egg in other plants, but when the larvae are hatched, they are good for nothing, and are usually found in the Henckley. In the latter, the eggs never hatch out, and when the crop is abundant a considerable proportion of the plants which escape being eaten.
