For family use, (and it is especially

with this view) the plants may

be started in a little box in a

warm room; and all the plants in a

hot bed or green house. In getting

started in a small box all the plants

may be grown. A few plants will

be worth a great deal more than

a large number of ill-grown ones.

It is not so often seen as would

be supposed that the plants in a

hot-bed, such as those in a hot-bed,

can have no value. The plants

need be no more than two feet long,

a foot wide and a few inches deep,

covered with glass to contain the

heat of the atmosphere of the room.

Put the box in the sunshine, keep

the room warm and carefully

ventilated. Do not be in too great

haste to germinate the seeds, but

once started, let the plants get

no check from want of care.

WHEN TO SOW SEED FOR AN EARLY

CROP.

In the neighborhood of New York,

the seed may be sown about the

middle of February or beginning of

March.

TRANSPLANTING.

When the plants are two or three

inches high they may be put in

small pots to be afterwards

transplanted into larger ones, or

into a hot-bed. The transplanting

should be done in the evening,

and the plants should be watered

well. If convenient, the plants

may be put in a cold frame,

protecting them from frost as

much as possible.

If the above plan be followed

faithfully you will have an

abundance of fine healthy plants,

which are so necessary for the

early crop of tomatoes.

OPEN GROUND CULTURE.
