We departed from the landmarks established in revolutionary times. by a patrician recognition of a man's "right of birth "-thus aiming a death-blow at the grand fundamental principle of DEMOCRATIC EQUALITY; a principle which cannot be ignored without radically changing the character of our government.

This insisting upon a birth test was rapidly followed by the frightful unconstitutionalism which, with all the venal longing of gross bigotry, imperiously demanded a religious test ! It came to this. that
