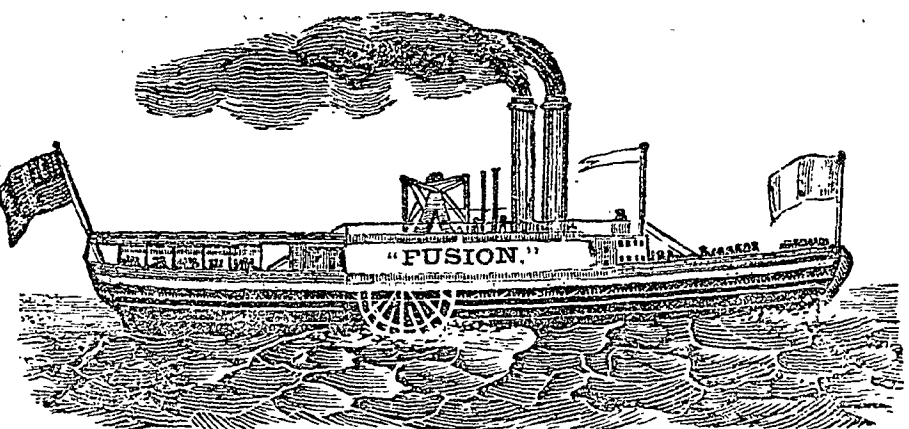

MONDAY, Nov. 3.—The Flour market is steady, with a moderate demand for export, and we notice sales of 1,300 bushels superfine at \$8.75; 100 bushels mixed brands at \$6.75; 1,000 bushels extra at \$7.25, and 100 bu. at \$7.25; the steady supply of the city retail trade at \$8.25; \$2.50 for common to extra family; \$2.80 for fancy. Rye flour scarce and wanted at \$4. Corn meal had at \$3.50 for Pennsylvania. Wheat in good demand with moderate supply, and prices well maintained; sales 8,000 bush at \$1.57 for prime Southern and Pennsylvania red; \$1.65 for 65 lbs. for white, and \$1.70 for prime to 100 lb. in fair demand; sales of 1,000 bush at 80c. Corn active and in good demand; sales 11,000 bush good southern yellow at 65c, and 66c in store; a lot of 2,000 bush choice white at 65c. Oats steady; sales 1,500 bush good Jersey at 45c.
