TO ESOLUTION proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof:

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. SEC. 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the generally assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and afty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted and to no other purpose whatever.

See 2. In addition to the above limited power the State may contract debts to repay livasion. Suppress. may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the State; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts and to no other nursose whatever.

SEC. 3. Except the debts above specified in sections one and two of this article no debt whatever shall be created by, or in behalf of the State.

SEC. 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first assion after the adoption of this amendment, create a staking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to require the principal thereof by a sum not less than the reduce the principal the cof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net amanual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the State, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of sic its owned by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the St. te, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinkmy tand shall be used or applied otherwise than in extin

ing tand shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such user, duced below the sum of five millions of dollars.

Sec. 5. The credit of the Commonwealth shall not in any manner or event, be pledged or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation or association; nor shall the Commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner or stockholder in any company, association, or corporation.

Sec. 6. The Commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or our part thereof of one country airs because the or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the State to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the State in the dischage of any portion of its present indebtedness.

SEC. 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholders in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corpora-

or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county, by a vote of the clectors thereof; nor shall any new county be established containing less than four hundred square miles

THIRD AMENDMENT.

From section two of the first article of the Constitution strike out the words, "of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively;" from section five, same article, strike out the word, "of Philadelphia and of the several counties;" from section seven, same article strike out the words "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," and insert in lieu thereof the words, "and no;" and strike out section four, same article, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

ing:

"Sec. 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and distributed equally, throughout the State, by districts in proportion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city-containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative."

tive."
At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; and no ward shall be divided in the formation thereof."
The legislature at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divided the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged untill the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional section to the first article of said constitution, which shall be numbered and read as follows:
Sec. 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter. revoke, or annul, any charter of incorporation bereafter conferred by, or; under any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the Commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators. AT The above amendments will be submitted to a vote

of the people at the next election.
