and agreed to. [See Ordinance.] On motion J. Simpson Africa was appointed Superintendent, and Samuel Africa, Sexton, of the Cemetery.

On motion of Mr. Gwin and Mr. Black, the Secretary was authorized to procure the printing of the Ordinance in handbills, and to have the same placed in proper places in the Cemetery, and also to procure the printing of the certificates mentioned in the Ordinance.

The check rolls of William K. Rahm, Supervisor, for May, June, and July, and John White, Supervisor, for July, were read and approved.

John Africa, late Supervisor, appeared, and on settlement of accounts there apppeared as follows, viz:
