Letters to My Daughter.

My DARLING DAUGHTER:-In this letter ! shall consider the love of appearance; and show what value I would have you put upon it. It is not my intention in these letters to ridicule the awful taste displayed by many in order to appear: a simple suggestion on that part will suffice. Its appearance was often made a matter of jest: so then it resolved to go to the water brook where it could see its image and decide for itself. On looking into the water it was surprised to find what changes the anxieties of the journey had produced; and it then resolved to return to its native pastures.
