Death Warrant of Jesus Christ.

Of the many interesting relics and fragments of antiquity which have been brought to light by persevering researches of modern philosophers none could have been more interesting to the philanthrophist and believer than the one we publish below. "Chance," savs the Courier des Etals Unis, "has just put into our hands the most imposing and interesting judicial document to all Christians that has been recorded in human annals—that is, the identical death warrant of our Lord Jesus Christ." The document was faithfully transcribed by the editor, in these words:-

Sentence rendered by Pontius Pilate, acting Governor of Lower Galilee, stating that Jesus of Nazareth shall suffer death on the

In the year 17 of the Emperor Tiberius Cæsar, and the 27th day of March, the city of the holy Jerusalem-Anna and Caiphas being priests, sacrifiscators of the people of God—Pontius Pilate, Governor of Lower Galilee, sitting in the presidential chair of the portory condemn Jesus of Nazareth to die on the cross between two thieves—the notorious and great evidence of the people

1. Jesus is a seducer. 2. He is seditious.

3. He is an enemy of the law.

4. He calls himself falsely the son of God. 5. He calls himself falsely the King of Israel.

6. He entered into the temple followed by a multitude bearing palm branches in their hands. Orders the first centurion, Cuilius Corne-

lius, to lead him to the place of execution. Forbids any person whomsoever, either poor or rich to oppose the death of Jesus

The witnesses who signed the condemnation of Jesus are-

1. Daniel Robania, a Pharisee.
2. Soannes Robania Soannus Robani.

3. Rapæl Rabani. 4. Cabet, a citizen.

Jesus shall go out of the city of Jerusalem by the gate of Struenus.

The above sentence is engraved on a copper plate; on one side are written these words:-"A similar plate is sent to each tribe."

It was found in an antique vase of white marbe while excavating in the ancient city of Aduilla, in the kingdom of Naples, in the year 1810, and was discovered by the commissioners of arts of French armies. At the expedition of the Naples it was enclosed in a box of ebony, as the sacristy of the Charton. The French translation was made by the Commissioner of Arts. The original is in the Hebrew language.


