#### A Thrilling Incident in the Life of a Lecomotive Engineer.

"About half a mile from the village of B. there is a nice little cottage but a few feet from the track. At that time a young married couple lived there. I had taken a great deal of interest in the little fellow, and had thrown candy and oranges to him from the train, and I was sure to see him peeping through the fence when my train passed.
