Also, that in the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, en-titled "An Act relating to executions and for other purpo-ses," approved April 10th, 1840, it is enacted that the afore-said 18th section "shall not be so construed as to prevent any militia or borough officer from serving as judge, or in-spector or clerk of any general or special election in this Commonwealth."

Common wealth." Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 67th section of the act aforesaid, the judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one of the judges from each district at the Court House, in the borough of Huntingdon, on the third day after the day of election, being for the present year on Friday, the 15th of October next, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said judges. Also, that where a judge by sickness or unavoidable acci dent, is nuable to attend said meeting of judges, then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken in charge by one of the inspectors or clerks of the election of said is trict, and shall do and perform the duties required of said trict, and shall do and perform the duties required of said judge unable to attend.

Also, that in the 61st section of said act it is enacted that "every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be
