On the 11th of October, 1859, we witnessed the removal of seventy sugar maples, averaging fourteen feet in height, all choice selected trees. HOW TO IMPROVE CIDER.

Let the new cider from sour apples (sound and selected fruit is to be preferred) ferment from one to three weeks, as the weather is warm or cool. When it has attained to lively fermentation add to each gallon one quarter of an ounce of sulphate of lime. Stir the powder and cider until intimately mixed, and return the emulsion to the fermenting liquid. Agitate briskly and thoroughly for a few moments, and then let the cider settle. The fermentation will commence at once. When, after a few days, the cider has become clear, draw off and bottle carefully, or remove the sediment and return to the original vessel .-If loosely corked, or kept in a barrel on draught, it will retain its taste as a still cider. If preserved in bottles, carefully corked, which is better, it will become a sparkling cider, and may be kept indefinitely long.

In securing fruit for keeping during winter, the utmost care should be given it in gathering. Even the slightest bruise will lay the foundation for premature decay. Although some of the late apples and pears are not apparently injured at the time, by a slight frost, yetit is very hurtful, and should be guarded against. Many persons prefer to have their Isabella grapes to hang until they are subjected to a very slight frost, and we rather think they are improved in flavor, provided the freezing is not too severe.




