DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE. 'The State of South Carolina, having determined to resume a separate and equal place among nations, deems it due to herself, the remaining United States of America, and the nations of the world, that she should declare the causes which led to the act.

"In 1765, that portion of the British Empire embracing Great Britain undertook to make laws for the government of the American Colonies. A struggle for the right of self-government ensued, which resulted, on the Fourth of July, 1776, in a declaration by the Colonies that they are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States; and that as free and indeto levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all things which independent States ought to do. They further solemnly declared, whenever any form of government becomes destructive to the ends for which it was established, the right of the people to alter and abolish it, and institute a new government. these ends, they declared the colonies free, and absolved themselves from all the political connection between them and Great Britain was totally dis-

The declaration then sets forth the administration of the Government as formed by the colonies. It gives the treaty of September 3d, 1783, and continues:

"The right of a State to govern itself and the right of the people to parties amending the Constitution on the 17th of December 1787 were the several sovereign States. The Declaration maintains that the failure of one of the contracting parties releases the other. Fifteen States have deliberately refused for years to fulfil their constitutional obligations.— The committee refer to their own statements for proof. The fourth ar-

ticle of the Constitution is quoted. The increased hostility at the North to the institution of slavery has led to the disregard of their obligations, and the General Gorernment ceased to effert the objects of the Constitution.

We therefore, the people of South Carolina, by our delegates, in Conven-tion assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, have solemnly declared that the Union heretofore existing between this State and the oth er States of North America is dissolved; and that the State of South Carolina has resumed its position among the nations of the world as a free, sovereign, and independent State, with full power to levy war, conclude pence, contract alliances, establish commerce, and do all other acts and things which independent States may of right do. And for the support of this declaration with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honors.

In the course of the performance, all at once he leaped up, threw his arms around his father's neck and screamed with ecstacy, "O father, I can see! I can see!" His sight had instantly returned. And since then he has retained it in full vigor, except that un-der excitement there is sometimes a transient dimness of vision. The case is one of a remarkable and singular character.—Pres. Witness.




