Who made you Judge? He was elected properly under the Constitution. I didn't vote military duty. Whenever you have reason to believe that the purpose is to evade military duty, the order will authorize the detention of any person leaving his own State, County or Military District.

Second— Any person sedetained way.

Second— Any person sedetained way. for him, I wouldn't vote for him now, traitor. All such are either cowards or traitors. That's the whole of it .-We gave them more than they were entitled to. Now, then, why this re-bellion? Not because Lincoln was elected, nor because Breckinridge was not, on Douglas wasn't. Not a bit of years. But are twenty millions of people to be whipped by six?
