The following is the sentence upon Joseph Moore, pronounced by Judge Taylor, in conformity with the verdict of the jury:

"The sentence of the Court is, that you, Joseph Moore, pay the cost of this prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment for the period of six years in the Western Penitentiary, in the city of Allegheny, there to be impris oned by solitary confinement, at hard labor, and to be fed and clothed as the law directs, and to be removed to said imprisonment by the Sheriff, within thirty days from this date."
