Important Case Tried---Liability of the Pennsylvania Railroad to keep the State Canal in Repairs. The important case of Barnes vs

the Pennsylvania Railroad, which has been on trial before Judge Agnew, of the Supreme Court, for ten days, went to the jury on Wednesday the 6th. The action was brought to recover damages for the alleged neglect of the defendants to keep the State Canal.in good repair. On the part of the plaintiff it was claimed that the repairs to the Canal were not made as required by the act of Assembly, and hence he suffered great loss by detention, &c. The Company answer that the Canal was under bad repair when they took possession, and the policy has been to repair gradually, so as not to interfere with the navigation, and that these repairs have been in pursuance of the recommendation of competent engincers, and the outlay has exceeded the income of the Canal. The legal obligation on the company is to commence 'immediately' This the Court construes to mean that the company was to immediately take the necessa ry steps towards the performance of their duty, and the law is not complied with by keeping the canal in as good condition as it was when transferred to the company. But the act does not require the company to increase the facilities on the canal, unless the company thinks proper to do so. The duty enjoined is to keep the canal up in good condition, that is the test of liability for damages. But when we come to the question of the performance of this duty, the condition of the canal when it passed from the State may be considered.

FLAX, FLAX.

HE HIGH PRICES RULING FOR Cotton Goods has compelled public attention to be more specially directed to the culture of Flax. It can be mad by some attention, one of the most valuable products a armer can produce; an acre readily producing 50 to 60 Dollars worth of fibre and seed. Great care should be taken by growers to have their Flax spread very thin when rolling; when watered sufficiently on one side, it should be turned, and subject to exposure until all the stalks get a grey color, and the lint resdily separates from the wood by a gentle rub.

It should on a very dry day be sied in bundles, and then ready for the mill. As a general thing too much seed is sown on an acre. Unless the ground is very rich one Bushel per acre is anticient. If the ground is very strong one and one fourth bushel is ample.
