It can be made by some attention, one of the most valuable products a farmer can produce; an acre readily producing 50 to 60 Dollars worth of fibre and seed. Great care should be taken by growers to have their Flax spread very thin when rolling; when watered sufficiently on one side, i should be turned, and subject to exposure until all the stalks get a grey color, and the lint readily separat from the wood by a gentle rub.

It should bil a very dry day be tied in bundles, and then ready for the mill. As a general thing too much seed is sown on an acre. Unless the ground is very rich one Hushel per acre is sufficient: If the ground is very trong one and one fourth bushel is ample. Dec 18, 1863.
