

It can be made by some attention, one of the most valuable products armer can produce; an acre readily producing 50 to 60 Dollars worth of fibre and seed. Great care should be taken by growers to have their Flax spread very thin when rolling; when watered sufficiently on one side, it hould be turned, and subject to exposure until all the talks get a grey color, and the list readily generate

from the wood by a gentle rub. It should on a very dry day be tied in bundles, and is then ready for the mill. As a general thing too much eed is sown on an acro. Unless the ground is very rich one Bushel per acre is sufficient. If the ground is very strong one and one fourth bushel is ample.
