The Burgesses and Town Council, of the borough of Huntingdon, have passed an ordinance appropriating \$12,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the payment of \$300 bounty to volunteers, and persons furnishing substitutes, under the late call.

and have issued bonds for the purpose of raising the money immediately. It is also provided as soon as it can be ascertained what sum will be needed, a tax shall be laid, according to law, to cover the bonds issued.

These bonds are of the denomination of \$100 each, payable in one year with six per cent interest, but as it is expected the tax will be laid within two or three months, those taking the bonds and not wishing to wait one year can get their money sooner.

These bonds are a good and safe investment and it behooves our citizens, especially those liable to draft, to come forward promptly and take them, so that there may be no delay in filling our quota.

ON OIL! The mania for oil is on the increase, the epidemic prevailing all classes, and absorbing the time, attention, and interests of every man of business.

Wherever any oil is discovered, or wherever any surface indications are apparent, there is a rush of speculators and capitalists is made, and the land and oil immediately bought at prices which the possessor never dreamed of.

In the western part of this State, more particularly, are developments of the oil product being made, and there, consequently is the rash. We have often been led to wonder why some of our men of enterprise and capital journey so far from home to seek their fortunes from oil lands, while buried beneath the soil of our own county a vast amount of the oily product might be divalged.

MELANCHOLY DEATH FROM SWALLOWING A PIN.—Singular and trivial, indeed, are the causes which sometimes lead to death! RECORD YOUR DEEDS.—The attention of parties holding unrecorded deeds is directed to the provisions of the Act of Assembly, which requires that—

"All deeds and conveyances of real estate in this Commonwealth, shall be recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds in the County, where the lands lie, within six months after the execution of such deeds and conveyances, and every such deed, and conveyance not recorded as aforesaid, shall be void against any subsequent purchaser for a valuable consideration, unless such deeds be recorded before the recording of the deed or conveyance under which such subsequent purchaser or mortgage shall claim."
