### PROCLAMATION.

Our President Demands the Ordinary Privileges and Immunities for our Na vy in Foreign Ports.—A Refusal to be met with Retaliation.

Another important proclamation is issued to-day, claiming that our vessels of war in foreign ports shall no longer be subjected to restrictions as at present, but shall have the same rights and hospitalities which are extended to foreign men of war in ports of the United States, declaring that hereafter the cruisers of every nation will receive the treatment which in their ports they accord to ours: By the President of the United States,

A PROCLAMATION. Whereas, for some time past vessels of war of the United States have been port, which on motion of General Wil- refused in certain foreign ports privi leges and immunities to which they were entitled by treaty, public law, or the comity of nations, at the same time that vessels of war of the country wherein the said privileges and immunities have been withheld have enjoyed them fully and uninterruptedly in ports of the United States, which conlition of things has not always been forcibly resisted by the United States although, on the other hand, they have not at any time failed to protest against and declare their dissatisfac tion with the same. In the view of the United States no condition any

longer exists which can be claimed to

justify the denial to them by any one

of said nations of customary naval unnecessarily persisted in—
Now, therefore, I, Abraham Lincoln President of the United States, do hereby make known that if after a reasonable time shall have elapsed for intelligence of this proclamation to have reached any foreign country in whose ports the said privileges and imday of the President's funeral.



Great care should be when rolling; when watered sufficiently on one side, it should be turned, and subject to exposure until all the stalks got a grey color, and the lint readily separates from the wood by a gentle rub.

It should on a very dry day be tied in hundles, and i hen ready for the mill. As a general thing too much seed is sown on an acre. Unless the ground is very rich one Bushel par acre is sufficient. If the groupd is very etreng ogeand one fourth bushel is ample.
