N ORDINANCE to establish and regulate a Market in the borough of

Huntingdon. Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted h Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgesses and Town Council of the bor-ough of Hintingdon, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful to have, hold and keep within the said borough, one market on Tuesday and one on Friday in every week of the year, on that part of Hill street known as "The Diamond." And the hour of opening the market shall be 5 o'clock, a, m., in ang the market shall be 5 o'clock, a, m., in April, May, June, July, Angust, and September, and 6 o'clock, a. m., in all other months of the year, and not carlier, under a penalty of Five Dollars against each and ev-

ery person violating the same:
Sec. 2. The Burgesses and Town Council
shall appoint a suitable person to Market Master, who shall perform all things belonging to his office, and shall be removable for neglect of duty, and another from time to
