## Congress.

The amended resolution, amendment to the Constitution, reported by the Reconstruction Committee was adopted by the House on Wednesday last, as follows:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, twothirds of both Houses concurring, That the following article be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by three-fourths of said Legislatures, shall be valid as part of said Constitu-tion-viz: Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed : Provided, that whenever the elective franchise shall be denied or abridged in any State on account of race or color, all persons therein of such race or color shall not be excluded from the basis of representa-
