

Soldiers' Widows. By applying to W. H. Woods, of Huntingdon, Huntingdon county, Pa., you can have your pensions increased two-thirds a month for each year since you have, and when the widow has married or died, the children no longer dependent on her.

Invalid Soldiers, Attention! The act of Congress approved June 6, 1860, gives additional pensions to the following class of men: Soldiers who have lost both eyes or both hands, \$25 per month; who have lost one eye or one hand, \$20 per month; who have lost one eye or one hand, and are totally disabled in the same, \$15 per month.

Local Bounties. All veteran soldiers who were discharged from the service of the United States, and who have received no bounty, are entitled to receive three hundred dollars.
