Our Western exchanges are very properly calling the attention of the farmers to the present great scarcity of breadstuffs and coarse grains through out the country, and consequently to the importance of planting more than usual breadth of land in such crops. The advice should be heeded. There is now no surplus in any of the Western States, and the exorbitant rates at which wheat and other cereals are now selling will in all probability be kept up beyond the present season, if they are not increased, unless the farming community pay prompt attention to the matter. In most of the Western cities, flour is selling for \$18,00 per barrel, wheat for \$3 50 per bushel, and corn 75 to 80 cents per bushel, and the receipts are small even at these prices. The papers complain that the season is unusually backward and unpromising, and farmers may feel some discouragement on this account, as well as on account of the stringency of the money market and the high price of everything they have to buy; but there is a certain guarantee Cunningham & Carmon. of remunerative prices for everything they can raise for a long time to come. Every farmer in this country should plant all he can positively cultivate during the present season and care for in harvest. The demands of our increasing population will fail to be met, and the material interests of the country will seriously suffer, unless this is done. Our advice to our farming friends is to plant largely.

THE CROPS .- From all parts of the country there come favorable reports of the crops, and since the grain has escaped the severity of the winter, uninjured, it is not premature to anticipate an abundant harvest. This is always a gratifying prospect, for the entire community is vitally affected by the aggregate yield of grainthroughout the country. The only exceptions to this favorable prospect are in the overflowed regions of the Southern States especially Louisiana, where the cotton and sugar crops are ruined by water, so that it will be impossible in many places to grow anything more than a small crop of corn during the present season. Apart from this calamity, the yield of cotton and corn in the South will be larger this year than it has been any season since the beginning of the war. The South is sorely in need of good crops, if the ensuing harvest proves all that appearances now promise, a great part of the distress that exists in the Southern States will be relieved, and better provisions can be made for next wintor. If the crops should fail, the condition of the South will be deplorable in the extreme, but there is no cause for any alarm at present ..

IMPORTATION OF WHEAT.-Official advices have been received at the Treasury Department at Washington, which indicate rather a remarkable state of things regarding the grain trade between this country and England, viz:-The shipment of no less than 40,000 bushels of wheat from Liverpool to New York. The two steamers of the Inman line, which left Liverpeol on the 6th inst., brought 8330 bushels. The City of Baltimore. which arrived at New York, on Wednesday, brought 10,000 bushels. The steamship Queen, of the National Navigation Line, which left Liverpool on the 10th, also took 22,291 bushels as a part of her cargo. These five steamers sailed within seven days. This state of things naturally attracts much attention.

Mr. Lyman B. Sanford writes to the New York farmer's Club that while in Canada lately, he paid an old English farmer ten dollars for a secret remedy for the disease in cows of abortion, which was simply to feed with the salt to each one about a teaspoonful of bono pounded or ground to a dust. As a result in a dairy of 32 cows he had lost none, while his neighbor's flocks ONE DOOR EAST OF THE WASHINGTON HOTEL were as badly afflicted as ever.-New England Farmer,

SLOBBERING IN HORSES. -A correspondent of The Boston Cultivator says that this is a disease in horses. Saltpeter, a tablespoonful for a dose, he has found to cure the worst case he ever had, and has not found it necessary ever to give a fourth dose. He gives a tablespoonful in the morning, and in three days, if the horse is not free from it, he repeats the dose.





The Act of Congress approved July 28, 1866, gives \$100 additional bounty to all soldiers who enlisted for three years and were discharged by reason of expiration of service, or who were discharged for wounds received in battle and who have not received more than \$100 bounty for such service. An additional bounty of \$100 is also at lowed to the nearest relative of soldiers who enlisted for a term of three years and who died or were killed in the service, to be paid in the following order: First, to the widow; second, to the children; third, to the father, and fourth, to the mother.

Soldiers' Widows.

By applying to W. H. Woods, of Huntingdon, Huntingdon county, Pa., you can have your pensions increased two dollars a mouth for each and evry elid you have, and when the widow has married or died, the childron are entitled to the increase.

To all who have brought home the bodies of their friends who died or were killed in the service of the United States, there is a certain amount of compensation allowed you for the expenses incurred in bringing home the bodies of your triends, which you can obtain by making application to me.

Invalid Soldiers, Attention I The act of Congress, approved June 6, 1866, gives additional pensions to the following class of persons:
Solidiers who have lost both eyes or both honds, \$25 eer month; who have lost both feet \$20 per month; who may be not feet \$20 per month

States Government, can be restored to the pension roll by applying to me.

Fathers and mothers who were in whole or in part dependent upon their sons for support are entitled to a ponsion. Also brothers and sisters under sixteen years of age.

All discharged soldiers who did not receive transportation to their places of enlistment when discharged, are entitled to receive it; and also all who were held as prisoners of war, and did not receive commutation of rations when released or discharged, are entitled to it.


