It is sometimes very interesting, says the Hollidaysburg Standard, to poruse old papers, published a half century or more ago, before the discovery of steam, electricity, and railroads; and more especially when the papers were printed in our county, from, which we can glean facts that give us some idea as to how our grand fathers and great graud fathers "lived and moved and had their being" in days long gone by. We are indebted to our esteemed friend and tellow citizen, James McCahan, Esq., for full files of his father's paper, published in Huntingdon-ye ancient borough-in 1802. There was no canal then-no railroad-we would say, "no nothing." All this country was then one vast wilderness. We propose to give extracts from this paper from time to time, as space and time will permit, which will be of much interest to our readers and especially the old sottlers.

The paper is called The HUNTINGDON GAZETTE. And weekly Advertiser.

The first page of each number of the paper gives the proceedings in full of the Legislature, which assembled then in Lancaster city. Then follows:-MINUTES,

> OF THE PROCEEDINGS IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, OF THE

UNITED STATES. The first thing we notice in these "minutes" is the bill passed Jan. 21st, 1802, by a vote of 77 yeas to 12 nays, "fixing the military establishment of the United States." 




