Veto of the Arkansas Bill. The following is the text of President Johnson's message, vetoing the Arkansas bill: To the House of Representatives I return, without my signature, a bill entitled an act to admit the State of Arkansas to representation in Congress. The approval of this bill would be an admission on the part of the Executive that the more efficient government of the Rebel States, named March 2, 1867, and the acts supplementary thereto, were proper and constitutional. My opinion, however, in reference to these measures has undergone no change, but, on the contrary, has been strengthened by the results which have attended their execution. If an objection to this bill, I could not consent to a bill which is based upon the assumption either that by an act of rebellion of a portion of its people the State of Arkansas seceded from the Union, or that Congress may, at its pleasure, expel or exclude a State from the Union, or interrupt the Government by arbitrarily depriving it of representation in the Senate and House of Representatives.

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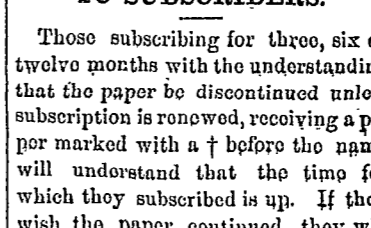
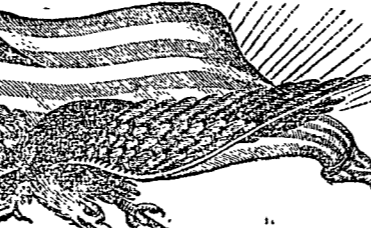
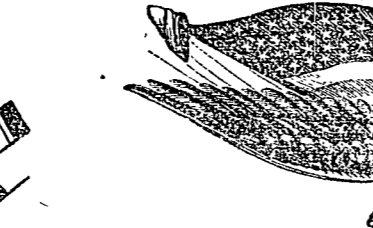

In force before its adoption, his disregard of the law of Congress, the Constitution undertakes to impose upon the electors other and further conditions. The fifth section of the Eighth Article provides that all persons before registering or voting must take and subscribe an oath which, among others, contains the following clause: "That I accept the civil and political equality of all men, and agree not to attempt to deprive any person or persons on account of race, color, or previous condition of any political or civil right, privilege, or immunity enjoyed by any other class of men." It is well known that a very large portion of the electors in all the States, if not a large majority, do not believe in or accept the political equality of Indians, Mongolians or negroes, with the race to which they belong. If the voters in many of the States of the North and West were required to take such an oath as a test of their qualifications, there is reason to believe that a majority of them would remain from the polls rather than comply with its degrading conditions. How far and to what extent this test had prevented the registration of those who were qualified under the laws of Congress, it is not impossible to know. But that such was its effect, at least sufficient to overcome the small and doubtful majority in favor of the Constitution, there can be no reasonable doubt. Should the people of Arkansas, therefore, desiring to regulate the elective franchise so as to make it conform to the Constitution of a large proportion of the States of the North and West, modify her provisions referred to in the "fundamental condition" what is to be the consequence? It is intended that a denial of representation shall follow, and, if so, may we not dread, at some future day, a recurrence of the troubles which have so long agitated the country? Would it not be the part of wisdom to take for our guide the Federal Constitution, rather than resort to measures which, looking only to the present, may, in a few years, renew in an aggravating form, distress and bitterness, caused by legislation which has proved to be so ill-timed and unfortunate?
