

HUNTINGDON, PA. GRANT AND SHEPHERD.

From the N. Y. Commercial Advertiser. General Sherman has refused to commit himself for Grant in a public speech.

The following is from Sherman's address before the annual meeting of the Army of the Tennessee: "After a whole year of toil and battles, varied in adventure that would fill a volume, that renowned fortress (Vicksburg) succumbed at last to the army of the Tennessee, led by two heroes who have no superiors in any country; and both of whom still live to reap the reward of their labors—Grant and Porter."

The following was General Sherman's speech at St. Joseph: "Gentlemen:—Mr. Grant and myself know how to appreciate any spirit of respect, but neither General Grant nor myself are to be disconcerted by any large crowd. We are used to large crowds, and we cannot be disconcerted. General Grant has declined to make a speech, and I think, occupying the position he does before the country, he acts the part of wisdom."

"Gentlemen, do not in general counsel violence, but were a citizen of St. Joseph, I would take that man (referring to the one who cheered for Seymour and Lee), down to the Missouri and duck him. We have fought Rebels, and we thought they had enough of fighting."

The following extracts from Sherman's speech of March, 1864, to Grant, congratulating him upon his triumphs:—

"You are now Washington's legitimate successor, and occupy a position of almost dangerous elevation, but if you can continue, as heretofore, to be yourself, simple, honest, and unpretending, you will enjoy through life the respect and love of friends and the homage of millions of human beings that will award you a large share in perpetuating to you and their descendants a Government of law and stability. * * * I believe you are as brave, patriotic, and just as the great prototype, Washington—as unselfish, kind-hearted, and honest as a man should be, but the chief characteristic in the simple faith in success you have always manifested, which I can liken to nothing else than the faith a Christian has in the Saviour."

TRUE WORDS.—Hon. W. H. Wadsworth, a member of Congress from Kentucky in the Thirty-eighth Congress, has recently identified himself with the Republican party, and we take the following extract from a speech of his delivered a few days since, in his State. Mr. Wadsworth says:—

I long for the coming of the bright day and the glory that will follow in its train, when all men shall be converted to the Union, and the ideas it represents in America. And I want some person like General Grant for the next four years to give play to the great energies born out of the civil war by maintaining, with his strong hand and resolute soul, peace, that the laws may be executed and do their beneficent work. I appeal to you, Union men, in behalf of the growth and development of our American Union, whereby all men shall be blessed, that you support the standard bearers of these great principles. We need for this emergency just such a man as Grant—a tried and true patriot; modest, but firm; a worker, not a talker, (any fool can make speeches); the strongest soul alive."

Some say he is not a great man. Well, he is the greatest man, at least, that the war gave birth to. He conquered Lee; therefore he was greater than Lee. Perhaps he was not a very great general, but he was Leo appeared very small. The American people feel that they need him—they will have him. May the issue be fortunate! If the issue is peace, the future is secure. That future will make plain the meaning of the great events in which we were actors. These triumphs and blessings for the future of our country will be due to the success of the Union cause. They are bound up with the success of that cause; they can only be secured by our fidelity to it. Today Gen. Grant carries our flag and heads the Union hosts; he is moving on the works of the enemy, routed by time, broken down by wrongs. We follow where he leads, with good hope of a victory that shall prove a crowning mercy."

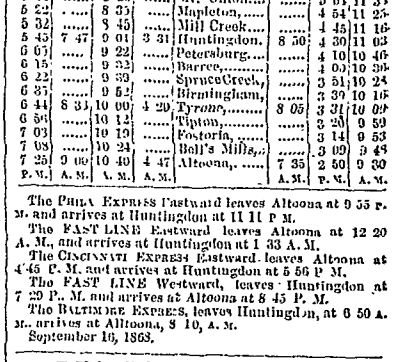
