The Fire at Dudley

A correspondent gives the following particulars of the destruction by fire of the Catholic Church at Dudley, this county, on the 28th ult.

The fire broke out at 11:30 P. M. on Sunday afternoon, the 28th. The circumstances are as follows: Daily and the congregation of the R. C. Church, (dedicated to the Immaculate Conception), left their services when the bell began to toll at 11:30 P. M.

At 11:30 P. M. on Sunday, an unusual occurrence and slight apparition. Fire was discovered issuing from the roof of the magnificent church. Crowds rushed immediately to the scene of the conflagration and set to work at once to extinguish the flames.

The church was built of very inflammable lumber and it burnt like a tinder. Through the roof between three and four hundred persons present they found all efforts unavailing—the fire spread with awful speed enveloping the roof in flames.

At 2:30 P. M. the church was entirely destroyed, and all danger was over. Great credit is due to the male portion of the congregation for their heroic courage, some having exposed themselves until they were black in the face.

The church was built in the form of a cross. The first part being built, I believe, in 1857 and '58. The second or cross church, it being additional, was built in 1858.

The cause of the fire is unknown; so far as I can learn it has been accidental. A fine electric guide and lighting system was destroyed.

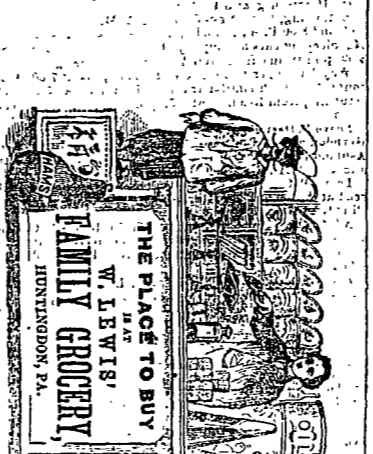
